

Where The City is your classroom!




Students can choose when and where to take their classes. This enables students to take inperson classes during the time of day that works for them, and take online classes to remain credit current. Students may also choose to attend more than one campus to take advantage of programs and courses that are campus specific.



STUDENT OPPORTUNITY

EXPERENTIAL LEARNING

All PXU City courses are designed to be experiential. Learning from student led projects, to learning in the city of Phoenix, students are offered the opportunity to bring the real world into their high school experience.





FOUNDATIONS OF LEADERSHIP

Students learn the fundamentals of leadership and participate in the Valley Leadership Catalyze Program-Catalyze is for any student who is ready to lead and be guided by Valley Leadership's Principles of Doing. While eleven program sessions will be held virtually, there are three in-person sessions and an optional in-person social during the program.

APPLICATIONS OF LEADERSHIP

Introduces students to action projects to improve our campus based on student observations. Students are part of PXU City's Site Council, where they take part in decision making processes for the whole campus. Students will create and implement a project that addresses a campus need or concern.

COMMUNITY IMPACT LEADERSHIP

Students take learning and experiences from previous courses and take action in thier community. Students will create and implement a project to address a need of concern in the community.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT

Student government, often referred to as STUGO, is a student-elected body that serves as a representative voice for the student body. It typically involves students working with faculty advisors to address student concerns, influence policies, and organize school events. Student government may also manage budgets for student activities, fund clubs, and address issues like campus safety and student well-being.

SEAL OF CIVIC LITERACY

Every student at PXU City can earn the Seal of Civic Literacy from the State of Arizona. PXU City embeds the majority of requirements into our events, conferences and workshop, as well as providing students opportunities for field trips and clubs that are included in the seal. YOUTH AND GOVERNMENT

The Arizona Youth and Government™ Program has provided outstanding experiential learning for over 75 years to youth from across the state. Youth and Government™ helps young people define the community action they wish to take, and teaches youth the legislative and judicial processes to facilitate social change. The semester-long program is hosted through several experiential virtual meetings leading students through topics such as parliamentary procedure, political parties, media, voting, bill writing, and debate policy. The semester concludes with the Model Legislative Session, which is held annually during the first weekend in December at the Arizona State Capitol. During this capstone experience, delegates will debate their bills in the State House and Senate, run for office, write a daily newspaper, and host State Supreme Court hearings.

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

STUDENT OPPORTUNITY

PXU CITY EXPECTATIONS

COMMUNICATION MENTORSHIP is a required yearlong course that builds skills for life after high school, including: having foundational knowledge, being a generous collaborator, mastering fundamental literacies, being an original thinker and learner for life. The class meets daily on TEAMS and includes required in-person meetings with the teacher.

ADVISORY is a required in-school period to support and enhance learning. Students complete a daily check-in form, and teachers may sign them out to make up work, complete assessmentsorrefineskills. Students may visit other classes for help or work on online courses. *ON-CAMPUS STUDENTS MUST BE IN THE CAMPUS LIBRARY DURING ADVISORY.

EVENTS

STUDIO SESSION/S PXU City students are required to attend 5 Studio Session/s. These events are focused on refining student skills while working with outside agencies and speakers. Studio Session/s are held in the District Office Governing board room. Student lunch is provided. Parent Permission Slip Required. Please avoid scheduling outside appoints on the dates below.

VOLUNTEER HOURS PXU City students are required to volunteer 20 hours a year. We will provide multiple volunteer opportunities through.

OTHER EVENTS Students are required to attend at least two school events outside of Studio Session/s. These may be workshops based on grade level like filling out the FASFA and college applications for seniors to ACT prep for juniors. Students and parents will be notified of all events through Parent Square, our TEAMS channel, and social media.




STUDENT SCHEDULES

Your student has a unique schedule that fits their current needs to balance school and life.

CLASS AND SCHEDULE TYPES

- Each class is built in two parts. Each part earns .50 credits. Taking both the first and second part of the class earns one full credit.
- Your student may have a mixture of Online, In-Person, and Hybrid classes.
 - Online classes from PXU City are 18 week courses placed in each semester of the year.
 - **In-Person** classes on campuses are 18 week courses placed in each semester of the year. Students complete the full class in one year.
 - **Hybrid** classes from PXU City are semester classes that meet online through TEAMS, and may have an in-person component.
- Your student may arrive to campus later than the start of the school day and may leave earlier than the end of the school day. Please help ensure that your student attends their in-person classes every day.
- Your student may attend more that one campus for in-person classes. Transportation is not provided unless part of a Metro Tech program. Students are responsible for ensuring they can safely make it to and from each campus.



TRANSCRIPTS & CREDITS

A transcript is a record of all of the courses a student has taken and the grade. Transcripts can be requested in the Registration office through the Credentials Specialist.

*Please allow 24 hours for processing.



FAQ ABOUT CREDITS

1. How do I earn credits?

Each class is broken into 2 semesters, Semester 1 in the Fall and Semester 2 in the Spring. You earn 0.5 Credits each semester you pass a class with a grade of A, B, C or D. For Example if you pass English 1 in semester 1 of your freshman year and English 2 in semester 2 you earned 1 credit of English.

2. What happens if I fail a class?

If you fail a semester, you must retake it to earn credit. Multiple failed classes make ontime graduation harder. For example, failing both semesters of Algebra requires retaking both. Courses can be retaken in Summer School or a Credit Recovery course.

3. How many credits can I earn each year?

Each class is broken into 2 semesters. You earn 0.5 credits each semester you pass a class with a grade of A, B, C or D. Every student takes six classes plus an Advisory class for a total of 3.25 credits a semester or 6. 50 credits per year.

COMMUNICATE HIGH EXPECTATIONS

An important way families can help their child succeed is to consistently communicate high expectations for student performance. Teachers can help families by sharing information about milestones students should

MONITOR THEIR CHILD'S PERFORMANCE

Families can support their child's success by regularly checking in with them and teachers. Teachers can support families by consistently and proactively engaging with them about student progress and by being available to families in a timely way.





SUPPORT LEARNING AT HOME

When families support and reinforce learning at home, their children do better in school. Teachers can help families support learning at home through consistent academic partnership and ongoing communication. Helping families create a series of thought-provoking, content-specific questions to ask children at home is just one example.

GUIDE THEIR CHILD'S EDUCATION

Families play a critical role in navigating their child's educational experience from preschool all the way through college. The school community can support families by connecting them to resources and activities that supports their unique needs.

ADVOCATE FOR THEIR CHILD

Families advocate for their children to ensure they get the personal attention and necessary support they need to be successful in school. Teachers can keep open channels of communication with families while school leadership can create a feedback-friendly environment. This could include a family feedback system, expanded office hours for family conversations, and proactively seeking in put from families about school policy decisions.

Students do better in school and life when their families are engaged. Research shows family engagement from birth through adolescence supports positive outcomes for students and schools, including improved school functioning.

- 1. Research shows that kids whose parents are involved in their school do better.

ATTENDANCE IS CRUCIAL FOR HIGH SCHOOL SUCCESS

Regular attendance from kindergarten through high school is key to academic and future job success. Families play an important role in ensuring students attend school daily and understand its importance.



DID YOU KNOW?

- Students should miss no more than 10 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other potentially serious difficulty.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, regular and high attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10 percent, or about 18 days, of the school year can drastically affect a student's academic success.
- Students can be chronically absent even if they only miss a day or two every few weeks. Attendance is an important life skill that will help your child graduate from college and keep a job.

Absence Intervention Flow Chart

This flow chart is based on an 18-week semester with classes meeting according to the PXU schedule or a 9-week semester with classes meeting daily.

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_	School Messenger ¹ will notify parent/guardian by phone/email for period and/or all-day absence.
1	Teacher will engage in a on-on-one, check-in conversation with student about the absence.
Absence in a Class	Student will obtain missing work from the content teacher per teacher's missing work/make-up policy and expectations.
	Attendance Notification Letter will be sent home to parent/guardian.
3	The content teacher will contact parent/guardian about absences.
Absences in a Class	Student will receive opportunity to recover missed learning through classroom/school-based intervention time ² in accordance with the course Plan for Success.
5 - 7	Phone banking team will contact parent/guardian about absences.
Absences in a Class	Student will be assessed by student liaison and/or a support services staff member to identify the reason (root cause) for the absences.
_	The student may be placed on an attendance contract and/or referred to a campus intervention ³ most appropriate to address the root cause of the absenteeism.
Consecutive School Day Absences	The parent/guardian will be notified when a student is placed on an Attendance Contract or an intervention is assigned.
	Students who have missed 7 consecutive school days will receive immediate attention from student liaison in prevention of a 10-Day Drop.
	A second attendance notification will be communicated to parent/guardian.
	Parent/guardian and student will meet with assistant principal and support staff to write a Plan of Action.
9	Student will complete a written reflection inclusive of solutions they propose for how to address their absences.
Absences in a Class	Student will be assigned tutoring and/or academic/support intervention and may lose privileges.
	Counselor notification
	If a student continues to be chronically absent after all intervention have been implemented/exhausted ⁴ , a follow-up conference with the parent/guardian, student, and assistant principal/SSC/designee will be held.
10+ Absences in a Class per Semester	If attendance continues to create barriers to learning, consideration for a modified schedule or alternative learning environment will be implemented to allow the student to be successful. Alternative learning environments may include evening classes (as available) or other PXU schools.
	At 12 excused/unexcused absences in a course, a student may lose credit after documented interventions have been exhausted.

ATTENDANCE

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Make school a priority

- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day, make that the expectation.
- Help your child maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- ° Try not to schedule dental and medical appointments during the school day.
- Don't let your child stay home unless truly sick. Complaints of headaches or stomach aches may be signs of anxiety.

Help your teen stay engaged

- Stay on top of academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors if necessary.
- Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- Encourage meaningful afterschool activities, including sports and clubs.

Communicate with the School

- Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalties
- Talk to teachers if you notice sudden changes in behavior. These could be tied to something going on at school.
 Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not piling up.
- Ask for help from school officials, afterschool programs, other parents or community agencies if you're having trouble getting your child to school.
